

ON BEHALF OF THE PEOPLE OF MICHIGAN, I, Gretchen Whitmer, governor of Michigan, do hereby proclaim

## January 2022 as RADON ACTION MONTH

WHEREAS, radon is a tasteless, odorless, colorless, radioactive gas that occurs as a result of the natural breakdown of uranium in soil and rock. It sometimes enters homes through openings in the foundation floor or walls; and,

WHEREAS, exposure to elevated levels of radon indoors is an environmental health threat, and exposure in homes is a leading environmental cause of lung cancer mortality in the United States; and,

WHEREAS, the United States Environmental Protection Agency recommends that homes with radon levels at or above 4 picocuries per liter (pCi/L) should be mitigated to reduce the lung cancer risk of occupants; and,

WHEREAS, elevated radon levels have been detected in homes and other buildings in all 83 Michigan counties; and,

WHEREAS, 26 percent of all valid radon tests conducted statewide returned results at or above 4 pCi/L; and many homes in our urban and rural communities have never been tested; and,

WHEREAS, any home, regardless of age or structural type, may have elevated levels of radon, even if nearby homes do not; and,

WHEREAS, testing for radon is easy and inexpensive, and the risk of developing lung cancer can be significantly decreased by reducing the elevated radon levels found indoors; and,

WHEREAS, radon-resistant techniques can be used during the construction of new residential structures to reduce the lung cancer risk associated with radon; and,

WHEREAS, during this month, we join with the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, local health departments, and other statewide partners to encourage citizens throughout the state to test their homes, have elevated levels of radon reduced, and incorporate radon-resistant features into new home construction;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Gretchen Whitmer, governor of Michigan, do hereby proclaim January 2022 as Radon Action Month in Michigan.
