Our parishioners work side-by-side and with our Vicar to:


- Act as treasurer.

Finances

The finances of Holy Family are managed by the Treasurer in close dialogue and communication with the Bishop's Committee. Four items are significant in our financials and will be helpful for you to understand the underlying financial condition of the church:

- 1. A significant monetary stream is from monthly shared costs paid by the Holy Family Children's Center for the use of church facilities.
- 2. Our Vicar's salary and benefits were shared under the terms of area ministry with Good Shepherd, which we foresee discontinuing. Going forward we anticipate maintaining a relationship with them but not sharing clergy.
- 3. Holy Family is the owner of a \$43,000 capital projects fund. This is a restricted fund and is not part of the stated cash balance in the checking account.
- 4. Holy Family has no mortgage.

Half Moon Bay Art & Pumpkin Festival



The Half Moon Bay Art & Pumpkin Festival is both a ministry and a major annual fundraiser for Holy Family. Each (nonpandemic) October, Holy Family and other nonprofits on the coast serve pumpkin-infused food and drink at



the festival. Holy Family sells pumpkin ice cream and bottled water to thousands of visitors during the two-day festival. The festival in 2023 was the 51st.



Annual Coastside Community Backpack Drive

Each summer, Holy Family spearheads the annual backpack drive. (Backpack drive funds are not part of our annual budget; 100% of drive donations are allocated to purchase school supplies.)

We work with other local churches and nonprofits to provide new backpacks filled with school supplies to Coastside children whose families cannot afford to purchase them.

In 2023, we gave away a record 521 new backpacks full of school supplies to children in need. It costs roughly \$60 to create a filled backpack for each child.

Holy Family Children's Center

We won't expect our new vicar to oversee our preschool, but it will be necessary to attend advisory board meetings at least bimonthly and to attend parent orientation, the back-to-school picnic, and other larger events throughout the year. It is important to show our preschool families that HFCC is a part of Holy Family Episcopal Church.

We expect our Vicar to meet quarterly with the preschool advisory board president (a church member) and the school's director to understand what's happening at the school and to provide some spiritual guidance and oversight. And, critically, lead chapel on a regular basis.

Coastside Jewish Community

In 1995, we offered to share our sanctuary and sacristy with the Coastside Jewish Community. CJC is an evolving congregation spiritually guided by Rabbi Moshe Heyn and Sheli'ach Tzibur (service leader) Lissin. Before the pandemic, CJC held Shabbat services in the Sanctuary twice a month. They are slowly building back, too. Our sanctuary also serves as the home of CJC's beautiful handmade ark, which sometimes houses CJC's Torah.

CJC is an inclusive community of people from a wide range of Jewish and other backgrounds. In keeping with the style and spirit of the Coastside, CJC offers programs accessible to all. The CJC liturgy, music, and ritual practice draw deeply from Judaism's rich spiritual heritage while infusing tradition with new meaning.

Challenges We Face

Attendance

Like most American churches, average Sunday attendance at Holy Family was profoundly affected by the pandemic, but we are rebounding. Our summer 2023 average has been in the mid- to high twenties.



Stewardship

Holy Family saw a slight downward trend through the middle of the pandemic. In 2019, we had 28 pledging units; for 2023, we have 26 pledging units. Recent visitors have asked about church membership, so we're hoping to get back to—and surpass—our 2019 units.

The decrease in pledging units was somewhat offset by the per-unit giving rate, which continues to remain high, even relative to other congregations in the Diocese of California.

Our Church Home

Our buildings are aging and need loving care. Thanks to a couple of large donations and knowing how to stretch a dollar, we are completing some long-deferred maintenance on our property.

Holy Family is looking for a half-time Vicar who will be a member of our church family, who will walk with us, cry with us, and laugh with us. We want to grow our parish family, which will help us better serve each other and the community at large. We hope you will understand, embrace, and thrive in our laid-back, come-as-you-are Coastside culture.

Our ideal Vicar will bring the following talents, attitudes, and skills:

Ministerial

- We tend to be inspired by contemporary language such as EOW and other approved resources. Please know that we seek a serious engagement with scripture and the world, yet we are comfortable with a casual style of worship.
- Be accountable first to God, then to our members and our mission statement.
- Be humble before God and recognize that your spiritual journey is a shared journey with us.
- Preach the Gospel with passion, articulating the meaning of the lessons to us in a way that is thoughtful, engaging, and invokes the Holy Spirit.
- Lead chapel for Holy Family Children's Center.
- Consider music an integral part of services. We draw on a range of music, including Wonder, Love, and Praise; Voices Found; LEVAS; and other music.
- Minister and comfort the sick, dying, and bereaved.

Leadership and Administrative

- With the wardens, be able to lead the Bishop's Committee to consider bold and new ideas for solving problems and meeting goals.
- Engage in pertinent social and civic meetings and events in Half Moon Bay,

including CoastPride Multifaith Partners and our local interfaith council.

- Be able to discern the qualities necessary and desirable in selecting (or nominating) our members for leadership positions.
- Maintain regular office hours at our Holy Family campus. Not all hours must be performed on campus, but we'd like to know that we'll see you on a regular basis.
- Have strong organizational skills.

What our new Vicar can expect from Holy Family

Our new Vicar will find a small, loving, and welcoming church with a strong membership. We will strive to nurture you in your walk with God. We will support you by being open to the leadership and changes that can make growth more likely. Our lay leadership is willing and eager to dream and act to achieve our shared vision for the future of Holy Family.

As a place of worship for more than 50 years, we are rooted in tradition but we are also open to trying new ways of doing things. We will never say, "But that's how we've always done it." If we do, please call us on it!

While it would be ideal for our Vicar to live on the Coastside, we understand the realities of living in the Bay Area. While it would be nice for our priest to live locally, it's definitely not a requirement.

Before you go, we thought you should know ...

Half Moon Bay and the surrounding community faced two tragedies at the start of the year, both of them superimposed on the COVID-19 pandemic that has reshaped our world: a season of severe winter storms and a mass shooting. Both tragedies continue to reverberate in Holy Family's spiritual life.


The first crisis was brought on by an unprecedented series of winter storms that caused extensive flooding and damage to many homes, buildings, and roads, inundated agricultural fields, and felled trees. The flooding was disruptive for many on the Coastside in part because of the extensive agriculture around Half Moon Bay. Holy Family property was damaged; most significantly, the roof of the main building was battered extensively and fences on the church property's perimeter toppled. A number of beautiful old trees came down during the storms. Fortunately, insurance covered repair costs, and most of the recovery work has been completed. In addition to enduring the impact on church property, members of Holy Family's congregation experienced personal disruptions because of the storms, including some temporary displacement because of damaged homes and property. We are all experiencing a deepened appreciation for the destructive and creative forces of nature, heightening our awareness of our call to be responsible for our living environment and loving stewards of "this fragile earth, our island home."


The second tragedy occurred on Jan. 23, when mass shootings took the lives of seven Coastsiders. This act of gun violence wrenched the community out of its sense of comfort. Grief, fear, and anger continue to reverberate within the community in response to the shootings. Life on the Coastside has been changed in ways that are still being revealed. Holy Family played a key role in an inter-religious prayer vigil the day after the shootings as well as in the days that followed as the community gathered to mourn, to remember, to pray, to support one another in community, and to reflect on how to respond to the hidden suffering that was revealed in the aftermath. The mass shootings exposed the often substandard housing for farm workers.

Combined with the pandemic and the severe winter weather, the shootings caused profound difficulties for the agricultural community. Those of us who were previously unfamiliar with this community's needs have felt the wound to our communal sense of pride. The Coastside that we thought we knew—a friendly, neighborly, communal environment—has been rocked to its core. For many, this has been an experience of the biblical metaphor of "scales falling from one's eyes." Out of this tragedy has come a deepened commitment to improve housing options for the poor and other vulnerable populations. This focus on housing continues to drive many in Half Moon Bay, including the Holy Family community, and it likely will continue to do so for years to come.
