# **News from the Town Manager**

### Town Manager's Report - Investing in Our Future and Ourselves!

Last month I wrote about the Budget and Town Meeting Warrant generally and touched briefly on the **Fairgrounds Community Park and Conservation Project** and the **Readfield Community Broadband Project**. This month I will focus in more detail on these two important community building projects and how they will strengthen our connections to one another and bring more opportunities to our youth, families, entrepreneurs, and older residents. These projects are certainly not free, but their cost is reasonable and is put into perspective relative to the value they bring to our community. We have the opportunity to invest in ourselves and the future of our Town, and I hope we do that!

### The Fairgrounds Community Park and Conservation Project will:

Add much needed recreational opportunities for everyone in our community. Keep a vast majority of the Fairgrounds property preserved as either open fields or woodlands. Balance environmental impacts and conservation priorities with other important uses. Serve our town for several decades with minimal changes. Pursue grant funding and community contributions to minimize the impact on taxpayers. Cost the average homeowner about \$20 per year, and less if we receive grants and donations!

The Community Broadband Project will:

Make reliable high-speed internet available to everyone in town no matter where they live. Provide through a Maine based company with Maine based customer support and Maine based technical support.


Encourage business development in town, and support the many home-based businesses already thriving here.

Give control (ownership and service provider accountability) to our community as opposed to a for -profit company. That brings a lot of value to our residents in many different ways!
Offer multiple service options from 100Mb/s to 1Gb/s symmetrical - guaranteed, not "up to". Pursue grant funding and community contributions to minimize the impact on taxpayers. Include assistance to lower-income residents that could reduce their cost to about \$10/month Cost the average homeowner about \$60-\$70/month (including the tax impact, service costs, everything). Installation will be free for everyone who pre-subscribes.

Building Community is about working together and making informed decisions together. These two projects are intended to benefit everyone in our town directly or indirectly, not just a select few. Sometimes that means we share the cost but that doesn't mean everyone agrees with or wants to pay for these things. We want to know that, and we of course want to know if you do! At our Special Town Meeting in November we had the highest voter participation we've ever had since we switched over to the Secret Ballot process. That's impressive but I hope we beat that record. Please vote on June 14!

## Kathryn Mills-Woodsum-Candidate for Select Board

To my fellow Readfield residents, I am Kathryn Mills Woodsum and am seeking another term on the Readfield Select Board. My husband I have lived in the Kents Hill section of Readfield for 43 years. We raised our family here, they went to school in town and my husband and son operate a business here, Great Northern Motor Works. I have worked at Saunders Manufacturing here in town, and recently retired from 33 years of teaching Mathematics at Mt. Blue High School in Farmington and now spend my days at the shop.



I have served the town in several capacities over the past 19 years including 12 years on the Select Board, having served as both Chair and Vice-Chair at times. I worked on the Budget Committee for seven years, having been Chair for several years when we developed our first CIP, Capital Investment/Improvement Plan, and have received a Spirit of America award for public service in 2013. I also serve on the Solid Waste and Recycling Committee and the Broadband Committee. During the last three years my Select Board colleagues and I, with the help of the Budget Committee, have developed three consecutive budgets without a mil-rate increase during a very challenging time for all of us, both locally, state-wide and nationally. Our next three years will be equally as challenging trying to maintain town services and our quality of life at the lowest possible cost during inflationary times. I am proud to serve with the members of our Select Board who give their time to research the issues and listen to the input of all residents, making decisions that benefit the entire town while following all laws. It is always the duty of the Select Board to follow the directive set by town meeting vote and to move forward.

This June, in addition to the election of town officials, we have two warrant items which will go a long way towards shaping the future of Readfield. They are the Readfield Fiber Project and the Fairgrounds Community Park and Conservation Project. The Select Board, Town Manager, Broadband Committee and Recreation Committee have spent the past three years developing what we think are the best options to provide a fiscally responsible long-term way forward for both.

**Broadband/Fiber:** I have served as the Select Board representative for the regional group formulated to develop a plan. As a group we evaluated all the available solutions and determined that a fiber optic network is the best option for now and the foreseeable future considering increased demand for capacity and speed. We started out with six towns working towards a shared solution which we did not find. However, it now appears that four of the towns, Wayne, Vienna, Mt. Vernon and Leeds, are taking the same path that we are recommending for Readfield, and that is a fiber to every premises network. Fayette is deciding at their Town Meeting in June between a RedZone wireless approach or a fiber network. Leeds has just received a \$2.1 million dollar grant from ConnectMaine, so there is hope that we may receive a grant also in the next round this fall if voters approve our project.

In November 2021 Readfield voters approved three warrant articles directing us to continue pursuing a solution to our broadband issues. The Select Board is excited to offer this equitable, cost effective, reliable, high speed fiber network to every property in our town making Readfield an even more desirable place to in which to live and work. As we promised, we are returning for voter approval to enter the proposed contract.

**Fairgrounds:** The key issue concerning the Fairgrounds project is to be able to provide athletic fields for our girls who have none, and to provide fields that are under town control to guarantee accessibility should RSU 38 facilities become unavailable again as they did during the pandemic. The Fairgrounds were deeded to the town with the stated intent to be a multi-use recreation facility. The town has worked with the Conservation Commission to preserve the most valuable sections while utilizing the land for the benefit of the residents on a best practices basis. The plan documents include an additional grass softball field that can be multi-use in conjunction with the baseball field for soccer and lacrosse, a basketball court, a small concession booth, walking paths between the fields, and new garden areas while preserving the current trails, and don't include any sidewalks.

Please visit the town website <u>readfieldmaine.org</u> where you can access an abundance of information on the development and implementation of both projects. I have worked hard with my colleagues to develop and support these projects, I stand by them, and urge you to support them. I would appreciate your vote on June 14th to continue serving our town in this leadership role on the Select Board.

# **RULES OF THE READFIELD TOWN BEACH**

- 1. All users of the property are required to have a season permit or purchase a guest pass.
- 2. All users of beach, water and property assume all risk. There is **NO LIFEGUARD** available at any time.
- 3. Beach hours: 9:00 am 8:00 pm.
- 4. All attendants have the right to stop any behavior which they feel is dangerous.
- 5. All posted public health rules must be followed.
- 6. All children 14 & under must be supervised by an adult remaining on the property at all times.
- 7. When arriving at Beach please:
- 8. Drive slowly and use caution in parking area
- 9. Show permit to attendant on duty (or purchase day pass from attendant)
- 10.Keep permit visible on dashboard at all times
- 11. Possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages or drugs is prohibited.
- 12. No glass of any kind is allowed on the property.
- 13. No animals of any kind are allowed on the property.
- 14. All boats (including windsurfers, canoes, and kayaks) are to be kept out of the swim area, and may come ashore on the west side of the beach, outside the buoys.
- 15. No fishing allowed within the beach buoy area.
- 16. No swimming beyond the buoys and no rough play anywhere.
- 17. The use of floats and rafts in the swim area will be limited by the discretion of the attendant on duty.
- 18. Swimming diapers are required for all children wearing diapers. Soiled swimsuits or diapers may not be rinsed out in the lake. Failure to provide a swim diaper for your child while in the water is cause for immediate revoking of your permit.
- 19. There are no trash cans available anywhere on the Beach property; therefore we have a "carry -in, carry-out" policy for all trash.
- 20. There is absolutely no tobacco use or vaping allowed anywhere on the property.
- 21. All holes dug in the sand must be filled in when play is finished.
- 22. Permit holders wishing to have any group function should call the Readfield Town Office at 207-685-4939 in advance to arrange fees and schedule times.
- 23. No inappropriate language of any kind will be allowed.
- 24. All music must be kept to a level as to not to disturbed others using the beach.
- 25. All grill fires need to be doused with water before leaving.

Readfield Handy Helpers provide home repair and maintenance services without charge to older adults or people who need assistance who live in their own homes. The only cost is for any parts needed.

Work is done by volunteers who make it their mission to help people in our community. Many of the volunteers are members of our local Mason Lodge located in Readfield who make it their mission to provide assistance.

Handy Helpers are not licensed carpenters, plumbers, or electricians. They are home- owners—just like you—who know how to do simple home maintenance and repairs.

 $\Rightarrow$  We provide help with minor home repair and home maintenance services, including:

- Change light bulbs;
- Replace furnace or water filters; \* Install padlocks;
- Repair or replace door locks, handles, springs and closers;
- Help with weatherization.

 $\Rightarrow$  Simple Home chores. We provide help with routine home chores, such as:

- Move furniture;
- Secure carpets;
- Remove/install window air conditioners or screens for the season;
- Hang pictures or mirrors;
- Help hauling trash or clearing clutter on a limited basis;
- $\Rightarrow$  Information and Referral;
- Explain what is needed to complete a task that is beyond the expertise of the Handy Helper, such as building a ramp or replacing a roof

### Handy Helpers DO NOT:

- Provide emergency service;
- Help with outdoor work, painting, tiling, appliance repairs, major carpentry, wiring, or plumbing;
- Complete any installation that involves Code (e.g. install stair railings or new stove vent)
- Repairs for apartment dwellers are limited to personal items only. Other repairs are the responsibility of the landlord.

For the entire month of May, the Town of Readfield invites you to help keep your road and community clean of trash and debris! Volunteers who are interested are encouraged to adopt a road and clean it up at their own pace.



## We will also be getting together at the Fairgrounds as we have in years past to make a big push on May 14th, starting at 8:00 am and running until noon. Snacks and drinks will be provided!

However you want to participate, we are using a tool called "Signup Genius" to help us coordinate this effort. Go to www.readfieldmaine.org and sign up using the online signup sheet.

Trash bags, debris grabbers & other supplies will be available at the Transfer Station throughout the month of May and at the Fairgrounds on May 14th. Saturdays are designated as drop-off and pick-up days at the Transfer Station. We provide the tools & you provide valuable help to the town.

We want you to be safe, so we ask that you wear comfortable and appropriate Maine spring clothing, gloves, and **BRIGHT COLORS** (either yellow or orange safety clothing) so motorists can clearly see you. Tick and mosquito repellents are also recommended.

Bagged waste can be brought to the Transfer Station any open day in May. Just let the attendant know that you are bringing in waste from the cleanup. If you find items that won't fit in a bag, are too bulky, or require a fee at the transfer station (tires etc) please contact the Town Office and they will arrange for them to be picked up. ## **READFIELD FAIRGROUNDS**

### **COMMUNITY PARK AND CONSERVATION PROJECT**



The Fairgrounds is a ROUGHLY 36 acre municipally owned property located off of Church Rd. It was acquired by the Town in 1994 and has supported a number of uses over the years including conservation, parks and recreation, trails, and one of our most prominent cemeteries. Over the past few years the importance of outdoor recreation has become more evident and the Readfield Recreation Board and Select Board have worked actively with key stakeholders to propose a second phase of development to be considered by the voters. The table below shows the current and proposed use of the property from a land use

perspective. The Community Park and Conservation Project will add recreational opportunities and amenities for all of our residents while maintaining over 85% of the Fairgrounds property in woodland and open space!

The use of the property has been generally governed by a Proposed Management Plan from 1995 in conjunction with actions by various Select Boards, town meeting votes, and any relevant ordinances. The plan calls for thoughtful and balanced use of the property and is available on the town website and at the Town Office.

The initial phase of recreational development at the Fairgrounds happened several years ago based on an original site plan but was limited to the construction of a single baseball field and recreational trails. Since that time the parking lot has been expanded and the use of the property has increased, particularly during the pandemic. A tremendous amount of volunteer time and financial resources were contributed to the original project and have been an important part of the overall operation of the property ever since. We fully expect this community investment to continue with the Fairgrounds Community Park and Conservation Project.

The next phase builds upon the original plan and balances conservation and recreation goals while envisioning a multi-use facility that will meet the present and future needs of our community. This is not a substitute for the fields owned by the School District (access to these fields is limited), or a grand athletic complex for a big town - this is a community park for Readfield, with something for everyone. Proposed changes and improvements include:

### **Recreational Opportunities for Youth and Adults:**

- A softball field to match the quality and use of the existing baseball field
- The ability to host a long list of sports and activities that can happen by creating open space between the infields (soccer, ultimate Frisbee, community events, etc.)
- A basketball court that can also support pickleball courts

### **Conservation and Trails:**

- Removal of existing on-field parking and conversion to dedicated grassland
- · Removal of the access road that currently divides the field area
- A curated pollinator garden and planting of pollinator friendly species in the fields
- A new Kiosk for trail information, activity schedules, and community information

#### **Other Amenities:**

- A concession stand for community and sporting events
- A flagpole
- A well to support multiple uses including drinking water, water for the cemetery, and water for maintaining plantings (there are no plans to irrigate the athletic fields)
- A dedicated and more attractive location for portable toilets

This is not an exhaustive list but should give a very clear picture of what is being planned. For an even better picture check out the draft Concept Plans available on the Town Website!

The full cost of this project is currently estimated to be between \$350,000 and \$400,000 but we expect a LOT of community support, grants, and donations to significantly lower the cost. We have two articles on the June 14, 2022 Town Meeting Warrant - one to approve municipal borrowing (up to \$500,000 out of an abundance of caution) and one to approve the project. If we receive NO grants and NO community contributions the average homeowner would pay less than \$20 per year for this project. We hope you will support this incredible opportunity for our community, and if you'd like to contribute in any way please reach out to the Town Office!

# **NEWS & NOTES FROM THE TRAILS**

For the first time in over two years, the Readfield Trails Committee shared a workday with Kents Hill School students and staff. On Thursday, April 21, 2022 the two groups met at Readfield Fairgrounds to continue a re-surfacing project started last fall by Maranacook students. Residents Howard Lake and John Perry brought their tractors and expertise to work with the Maranacook Juniors in early October 2021 to start the process of re-surfacing the trails with the goal to eventually improve the whole trail system. The work last October, just like the work done on April 21<sup>st</sup>, was labor intensive using shovels, wheel barrows, rakes, in an all day endeavor.

Last October the Readfield Conservation Commission, Trails Committee, Town Manager Eric Dyer and Jedediah Talbot of OBP Trailworks LLC planned and carried out a day and a half of solid effort with Mr.Talbot's experienced and skilled employees and their motorized equipment to re-surface a large segment of the trails starting at the Route 17 trail head and heading northwest. Work will hopefully continue through the summer with community volunteers and again in the fall using student volunteer groups. It probably goes with out saying, but just in case someone may be reading the Messenger for the first time, all our town trails are maintained by volunteer labor. Each town trail has at least one steward that looks after the property with regular visits to ensure our town's trails resource are in good shape for the many users who walk, bike, hike, run etc. daily.

The Swap Shop is reopening on Tuesday, May 3rd



# READFIELD SWAP SHOP GUIDELINES Recycling Through ReUse

The Swap Shop is an area where items in good working condition may be given and taken in an effort to keep useable items **OUT** of the landfill. Everything is free and you do not need to donate in order to take items.

### Goals:

B

- To divert useable items in good condition from the waste stream and to reduce our disposal costs.
- To allow our residents the opportunity to extend an items' useful life.

### **Rules:**

- **Open only to** Fayette, Readfield and Wayne residents with a Transfer Station permit.
- ACCEPTABLE ITEMS: See attached list. All items must be approved by a Transfer Station employee before drop-off. Employees may use their discretion in allowing or refusing items.
- PICK-UP: During Swap Shop hours ONLY.
- **DROP-OFF:** Up to 30 minutes before Swap Shop closing time ONLY. Place items in designated area only.
- PARKING LIMIT: 15 minutes per day in designated spaces.
- VISIT LIMIT: 15 minutes in one visit per day. No loitering.
- CONDUCT: No unruly behavior, no smoking, no swearing.
- AVAILABLE ITEMS: All items are first-come, first-serve at all times. Town staff and volunteers may not remove items from the Swap Shop while on duty and may not set aside or otherwise hold items for themselves, other employees or volunteers, or members of the public. Items are for personal use only and may not be re-sold or transferred in trade.

# **READFIELD SWAP SHOP GUIDELINES**

## **Recycling Through ReUse**

### Acceptable Items:

B

- All items should be clean and in good working condition or be easily repairable. Do not leave items that are broken and cannot be fixed.
- All items must be approved by a Transfer Station employee before drop-off. Employees may use their discretion in allowing or refusing items.
- Toys, games, puzzles, educational items, etc.
- Household items such as kitchenware, canning jars, baskets, utensils, etc.
- Household electrical items such as fans, lamps, phones, small appliances, etc. NO TVs, monitors, computers or printers.
- Decorative items such as frames, prints, knickknacks, holiday items, etc.
- Baby items such as toys, strollers, high chairs. NO cribs, mattresses or car seats.
- Tools and hardware
- Garden, yard & outdoor items such as rakes, plant pots, decorative items, etc.
- Office furniture & supplies
- Furniture such as chairs, tables, file drawers. NO mattresses, box springs, upholstered or padded furniture.
- Entertainment items such as videos, DVDs, CDs, records, radios, recorders, players. NO stereo systems or components.
- Books and magazines.
- Any item that carries a disposal fee must be paid for prior to drop-off in the Swap Shop.
- Certain items will not be accepted in the Swap Shop for safety and other reasons. Such items include but are not limited to:
  - No pornography.
  - No liquids including paint, oil, gas, cleaners, etc. Paints in cans with labels go in the PaintCare bin outside.
  - No thermostats, ballasts, rechargeable batteries, or mercury containing devices. These are recycled; please see an employee.
  - No clothing, linens, bedding, etc. Donate to Goodwill or another shop, or place in the Apparel Impact bin outside.

# **News from the Broadband Committee**



### Town Meeting Questions on Broadband

On November 2<sup>nd</sup> 2021 voters in Readfield spoke loud and clear by approving three articles concerning bringing Internet service to all locations in our town. There were 1015 residents who voted out of approximately 2300 registered voters. Of those who filled in a choice the results ranged from 70% to 78% approval. These votes have provided a clear direction to the Select Board and Broadband Committee. Both groups are committed to a prompt follow-through by assessing the available solutions and choosing the best and most equitable one to be presented at a Town Meeting in 2022.

### News From the Broadband Committee May 2022

The committee met on April 13<sup>th</sup> and discussed the ongoing negotiations with Axiom and provided suggestions to the Town Manager for consideration. Eric will continue the process over the next two weeks along with a few folks from the committee. The plan is to have a draft contract ready for legal counsel review sometime in May. There is an experienced local area contractor who is interested in providing local fiber repair service through Axiom. There were two residents in attendance who spoke to the Broadband project at the Public Budget Meeting held on March 24<sup>th</sup>. Their comments were generally supportive with a few questions about concerns which were addressed by the owner of Axiom, Mark Ouellette, who gave an informative overview of the project beforehand.

News was shared that Wayne, Mt. Vernon and Vienna are all in contract talks with Axiom to provide the same service in their towns that Readfield is proposing. Leeds had already chosen Axiom for their network. Fayette is deciding at their Town Meeting in June between a Redzone wireless approach or a contract with Axiom. So, it appears that all of the six towns in the former WKLCBA (Western Kennebec Lakes Community Broadband Association) group are all headed to provide broadband services throughout each town.

The Select Board and Budget Committee have approved placing a Broadband article on the Town Warrant for the June 14<sup>th</sup> Annual Town Meeting. The article asks the town to enter a contract with a preferred vendor to build the fiber optic network throughout Readfield and then to operate the network on a long-term basis. This contract will provide 1-Gigabyte symmetrical fiber service to all locations, excellent customer service and network repair service, along with very affordable consumer pricing. Watch for more details to be posted as negotiations continue over the next month. We have developed a website addition dedicated to Broadband that provides information to the public via an addition to the town website which will be live prior to absentee ballots becoming available on May 13<sup>th</sup>. Look for the link on the front page of the Town Website readfieldmaine.org

The committee is meeting next on April 27th. We will be discussing updates from Axiom and the contract negotiations, website progress, and informational materials for voters. All meetings are public and will be held in person at the Town Office along with remote access. Look for links on the town website and for email alerts if you have signed up for them. Signup for email alerts is available on the town website. We publish monthly updates. www.readfieldmaine.org



### **Registration Open for Healthy Living for ME's May Workshops**

Free Workshops Available to Help with Diabetes, Chronic Conditions, Falls Prevention/Balance

Statewide - Mainers are invited to register for Healthy Living for ME's free spring and summer workshops which begin in May. The workshops are designed to help Mainers prevent or manage a number of health conditions while aiming to improve individuals' overall wellness. There are workshops available online, in-person, and by phone.

Mainers who are caregivers or supports for individuals living with conditions addressed in these workshops are also invited to participate.

"We are so pleased to be able to offer a wide variety of workshops across the state this spring. If improving your health and wellness is one of your goals for this summer, Healthy Living for ME can help. I encourage you to look through our list of workshops, and contact us if you have any questions at all. All of us at Healthy Living for ME are here to help Mainers!" said Jen Paquet of Healthy Living for ME.

The schedule and details for Healthy Living for ME's May workshops are as follows:

- Living Well with Diabetes (online) This workshop is conducted virtually and begins on May 3, 2022. It is designed to help people with type 2 diabetes by covering topics such as: dealing with diabetes symptoms, fatigue, pain, hyper/hypoglycemia, stress, depression, anger, fear, frustration, appropriate exercise, healthy eating, appropriate use of medication and working with healthcare providers. This workshop is provided in partnership with MaineGeneral's Peter Alfond Prevention & Healthy Living Center.
- A Matter of Balance (in-person) This workshop will be held at the Education Center at SeniorsPlus in Lewiston and begins on May 3, 2022. The class emphasizes practical strategies to reduce fear of falling and increase activity levels.
- Living Well for Better Health (in-person) This workshop will be held at the Northern Light Sebasticook Valley Hospital Campus in Pittsfield and begins on May 10, 2022. The workshop helps participants deal with ongoing conditions such as diabetes, COPD, arthritis, and high blood pressure. Topics covered include: handling frustration, fatigue, pain and isolation; appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength, flexibility, and endurance; appropriate use of medications; communicating effectively with family, friends, and health professionals; nutrition; and evaluating new treatments.
- Living Well with Chronic Pain (online) This workshop will be held online and begins May 10, 2022. This workshop is designed for people who are dealing with persistent pain such as back pain, post-surgical pain, headaches, and other ongoing pain. Topics covered include: dealing with frustration, fatigue, isolation, and poor sleep; appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength; appropriate use of medications; communicating effectively with family, friends, and health professionals; nutrition; pacing activity and rest; and evaluating new treatments. This workshop is provided in partnership with SeniorsPlus.
- Living Well for Better Health (online) There will be two of these workshops offered online. One will begin May 12, 2022, and a second will begin May 16, 2022. The workshop helps participants deal with ongoing conditions such as diabetes, COPD, arthritis, and high blood pressure. Topics covered include: handling frustration, fatigue, pain and isolation; appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength, flexibility, and endurance; appropriate use of medications; communicating effectively with family, friends, and health professionals; nutrition; and evaluating new treatments. These workshops are being provided in partnership with Northern Light Sebasticook Valley Hospital and Eastport Health Care.

• Better Health Now with Diabetes (by phone) - This workshop is designed for those who have diabetes or at risk of developing diabetes and/or their caregivers. It is scheduled to begin on May 24, 2022. Participants in this workshop receive a toolkit in the mail and work with a leader either by themselves or in small groups. Topics covered include techniques to deal with the symptoms of diabetes, fatigue, pain, hyper/hypoglycemia, stress, depression, anger, fear and frustration; appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength and endurance; healthy eating, appropriate use of medication; and working with healthcare providers. This workshop is provided in partnership with MaineGeneral's Peter Alfond Prevention and Healthy Living Center.

For virtual workshops, participants who do not have the necessary technology may be eligible to borrow an iPad from Healthy Living for ME in order to participate.
